Bangalore gets the pink eye

BANGALORE: The irritating. itchy 'pink eve' is back.

The first sign of winter has brought with it the conjunctivitis epidemic in the City. Leading eye hospitals like Minto Eve Hospital and Narayana Nethralaya are receiving over 30 cases a day.

According to Dr Arun Sampathi, eve surgeon at Naravana Nethralava, conjunctivitis is triggered by a virus that is doing the rounds this season. Most of the victims, he pointed out, were students, who have contracted the virus through interactions in school. "We are lately having entire families walking What is conjunctivitis?

Conjunctivitis is an inflammation of the conjunctiva, the clear membrane that covers the white part of the

eye and lines the inner surface of the eyelids.

- Symptoms:
- Discomfort or pain in the eye
- Sensation of having sand in the eye
- Redness of the eye and inner eyelid
- Swollen eyelids

Sensitivity to bright light Itching and tearing

Precautions

- Wash hands thoroughly and often
 - Throw away infected items like gauze or cotton balls after use
 - Wash towels and other linens used by the patient in hot
- water separately Don't share eyedrops,
- tissues, washcloths, towels, or pillowcases with patient

ry tract, a common cold, or a sore throat. Post Diwali. we are likely to witness a spurt in allergic conjunctivitis that is mainly caused due to seasonal changes," Dr Ganesh added.

According to doctors. conjunctivitis is highly contagious and spreads through even indirect contact.

"It is a myth that one can contract the infection by looking at a person with conjunctivitis. It is usually spread through contaminated hands or tissues. Patients and caretakers should wash their hands often," Dr Sampathi said.

It will take 7-10 days for the infection to subside. Dr Ganesh said.
